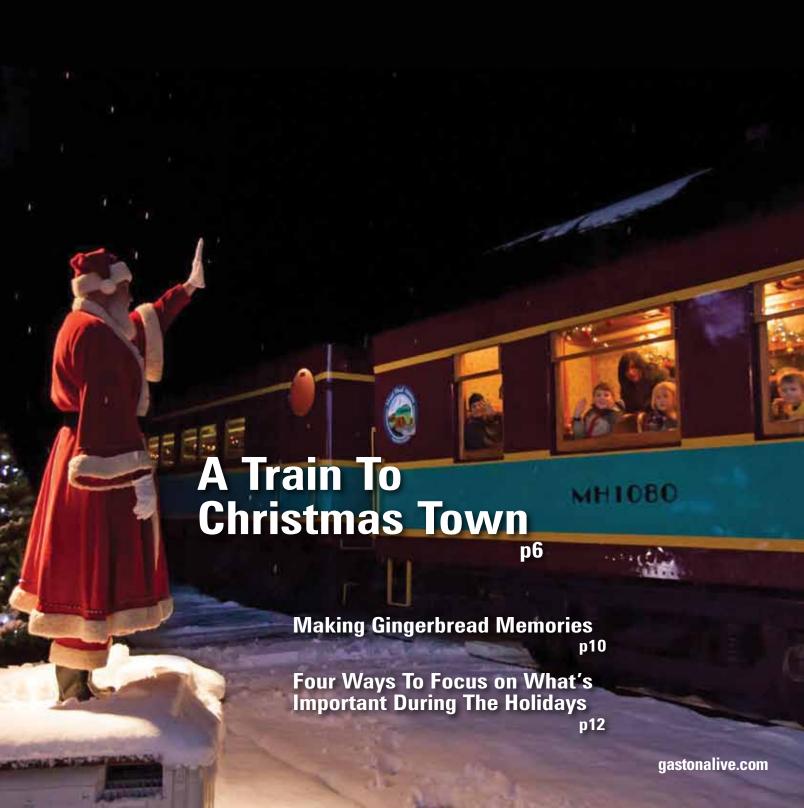
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#### FROM THE PUBLISHER

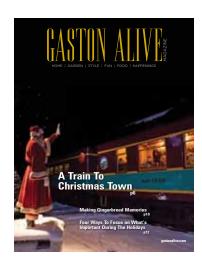

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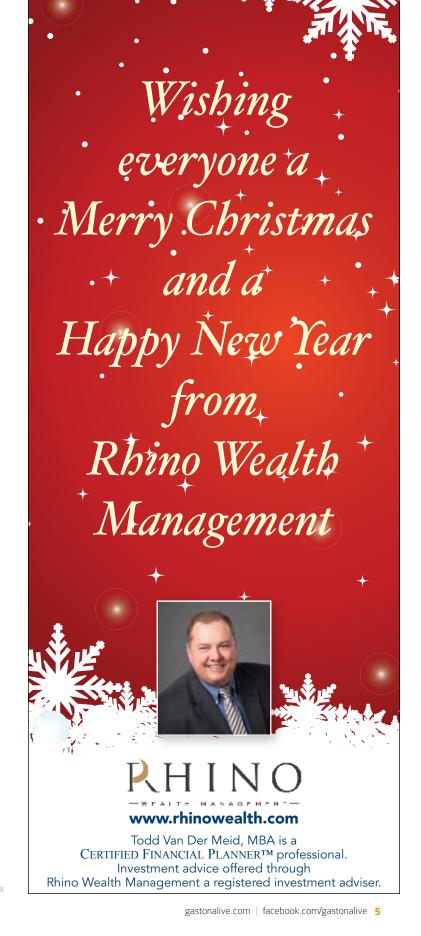
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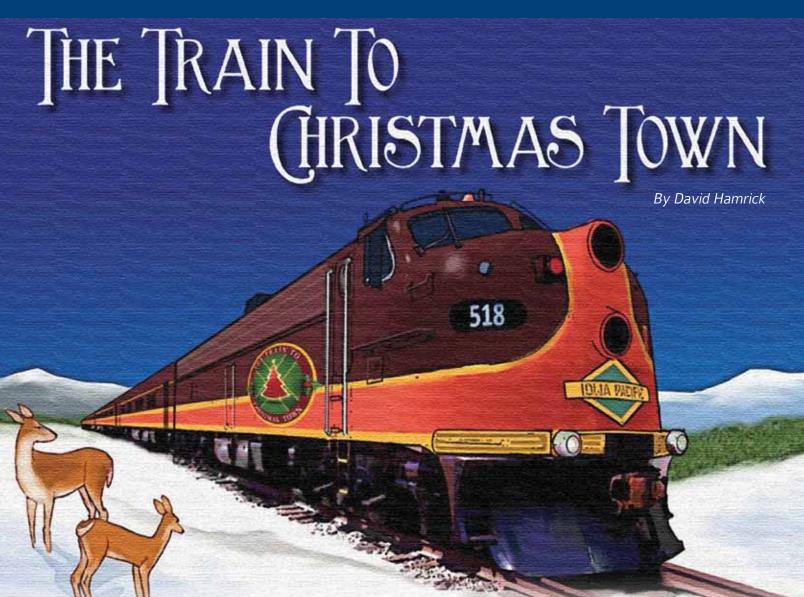

The Train to Christmas Town is an independent holiday rail experience and and does not include a visit to and is not affiliated with Christmastown, or McAdenville USA.



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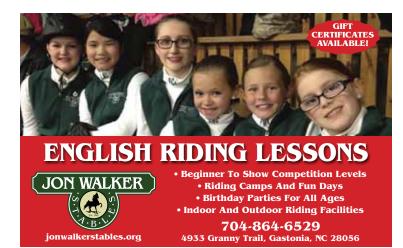


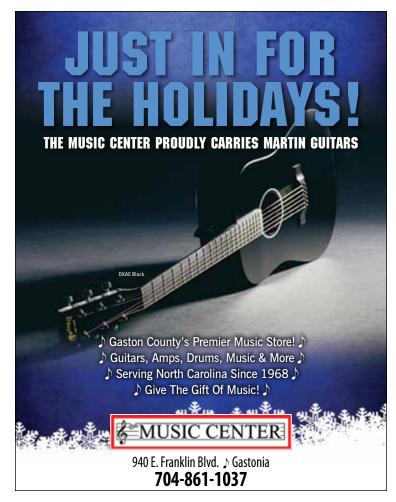


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# JOYS OF GINGERBREAD

I'm going to take a moment on a soap box, well since it is a cooking column maybe it's a cereal box, or since it's fast approaching Christmas it most likely all the boxes arriving in a steady stream from my online shopping.

On a recent trip I stopped to visit with friends who have been to Chez Glenn, they had prepared dinner and spent the whole time apologizing for the food. They said they almost made reservations rather than prepare the meal at home because it was intimidating to cook for me. Honestly, I have heard this before from folks and each time I have the same answer.

Food is about sharing time and space with people. The food itself, be it a disaster or the best thing you have ever put in your mouth, will be long forgotten but the company and the memories formed around the table last forever.

Oh sure, the stories about the meals, the epic failures, the undercooked Turkey, the burnt bread or the gorgeous presentation of a sumptuous plate will live on and become part of the lore shared around tables for generations. These stories shared with others and handed down through the generations become what binds us to one another.

Never make an excuse for the food you prepare, do your best fearlessly and if it doesn't work out you can 'just throw it across the yard' as is famously quoted around our house. I have dishes which fail all the time because I experiment, I learn, I push the envelope.

INGREDIENTS

½ cup of brown sugar

(or sugar in the raw)

½ cup of cane sugar

5 cups of flour

1 tbs ground ginger

½ tbs crystallized

½ teaspoon allspice

½ teaspoon cardamom

teaspoon cinnamon

¼ tsp salt

ginger

1 cup of butter

¼ cup of ginger

1 cup of molasses

simple syrup

softened

#### **METHOD**

To make the ginger simple syrup mix 50/50 water and white sugar bring to a boil, put shavings of fresh ginger into the mix and let simmer in the liquid, set aside to cool (strain out the ginger after cooled)

Mix the butter, brown and cane sugar until

smooth and fluffy (creamed). In a separate bowl combine the simple syrup, baking soda and molasses. Finely mince crystalized ginger (I used a mortar and pestle and some of the flour to break it up very fine). Mix all dry ingredients then alternate adding them to the creamed butter with the syrup/baking soda/molasses mixture, ending with the flour mix.

Chill dough for 1 hour and roll out to cut into the shape you desire. Bake at  $350\ \text{for}\ 12\text{-}15\ \text{min.}$ 

With all the hatred and violence in our world today here is the most important recipe I can share during this season of joy, be kind to one another, take a moment from the bustle to slow down, breathe, enjoy the twinkle of the lights and prepare some food to share. For me, cooking a meal for someone is my language of love; it's less about the food than it is the people with whom I enjoy sharing time and space.
